Tiffany Wightman and Jenny Redpath – Sexual Health Delegation (a)

SIMS teacher and counselor Tiffany Wightman and Jenny Redpath, home and community care nurse on Salt Spring Island spoke to Board members about Sexual Health Education (SHE) in School District No. 64. Ms. Wightman and Ms. Redpath recently received "Options for Sexual Health Educator Certification". As project coordinators, their plan is to present to principals, teachers, and parents; hold sessions with parents; target teachers of grade 4 to 9 students initially, hoping to expand to K-12 teachers over three years; co-create lessons and plans with SHE educators and classroom teachers and administer pre- and post-surveys to plan and monitor implementation. They would like to begin working with students in three schools now and continue until the end of June. Ms. Wightman and Ms. Redpath received a grant which they co-applied for with Island Health that will

7. <u>CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT</u>

(a) BCPSEA AGM Update

Trustee Macdonald updated Board members on the recent BCPSEA New Trustee Orientation and AGM held January 29 and 30, 2015. Highlights of both included:

- Conflict of interest presentation
- Exempt compensation and retention
- Legal services update, the notion of shared services and the implications for some districts having to pay for shared services when they don't require them
- Governance structure of BCPSEA, specifically as outlined in Article 7.2 of the BCPSEA Constitution and Bylaws. A proposed resolution was put forth requesting the reinstatement of the BCPSEA Board of Directors which was amended and approved.

(b) BCSTA Update

Trustee Middleditch will be attending the BCSTA Provincial Council on February 20 and 21. The agenda includes speeches from seven candidates for the Board of Directors By-election and one motion regarding "Increase in Funding of Educational Programs". Each Board of Education is to "develop a rationale for an immediate increase in funding for support for educational programs in their school districts…". Trustee Middleditch welcomes Board members input before she attends the meeting.

8. <u>CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT</u>

(a) Learning in School District No. 64 (Gulf Islands)

Maggie Allison, Manager of Career Development and Community Initiatives, spoke to the Board regarding the recent *Career Programs District Review* that took place on January 21, 2015. The daylong review was facilitated and attendees included students, teachers, trustees, Principals and Vice Principals, Senior Administration and community members. The group looked at the development and evolution of the career program since its

inception in 1990 to present day. They brainstormed throughout the day with ideas about career development and the career program and ended with where they would like to see it expand or change. Superintendent Halstead thanked Ms. Allison for her presentation and for leading the group through the review.

(b) Field Trip Request #79 (Fire Prevention Boot Camp)

An extra-curricular field trip request from Maggie Allison to send six Grade 10-12 students to Pender Islands Fire Hall March 23 to April 3, 2015, to participate in fire simulation, live fire training drills, physical training and coursework. Accommodation will be provided at Pender Fire Hall #1. This program has occurred for several years and is now a well-recognized program for dual credit at the post-secondary level.

It was moved and seconded that the Board of Education approves extra-curricular field trip #79 for six Grade 10-12 students to travel to Pender Islands Fire Hall March 23 to April 3, 2015 to participate in the Fire Camp program.

(c) Special Education Audit

Mr. Livingston updated Board members on the recent Special Education Audit stating that overall he is pleased with the outcome. The district lost five students for funding purposes: 2 in Chronic Health and 3 in Intensive Behaviour. The auditors validated: the rigour of screening and readiness to review files; changes made in MultPro3; file organization; and the role of the multidisciplinary team in orchestrating services. The district received verbal recommendations from the auditors; however, a written document with recommendations will be forthcoming which will become public information. The next steps in developing Learning Services practices include:

- Focusing on service provision
- Enhancing support for vulnerable students transitioning between schools and for new students
- Revising some forms
- Improving the workflow for screening and referral processes
- Enhancing the role of school teams to support "Learning for All"
- Ongoing professional development

(d) Kevin Vowles' Request

Kevin Vowles, teacher, Salt Spring Women Opposed to Violence and Abuse (SWOVA) facilitator and Master's student in Interdisciplinary Studies at Royal Roads University was present to speak to Board members about his Master's project titled: "Exploring the Lived Experiences of Violence in Youth's Social Lives". His specific research areas of interest include: "child and youth participation; youth participatory action research; theories of aggression and hypermasculinity as they relate to cyberbullying; leadership; sustainable community development, and effective violence prevention education". He is seeking Board approval of his proposal which will include administering an online survey to GISS students with help from the youth team. Consent forms will be distributed to those students who will be involved. He has received ethics approval for this research proposal from Royal Roads University. Superintendent Halstead recommends the Board approve Mr. Vowles' research proposal through Royal Roads University.

It was moved and seconded by the Board of Education approves Kevin Vowles' research proposal through Royal Roads University as presented.

(e) **Program Committee Update**

The Program Committee had their first meeting with new Board committee representatives on February 10. The main topic of discussion was with regard to the unprecedented number of presentations lately from groups focused on alternative methods of education who want to partner with the district.

Highlights of this discussion included:

- How does the district respond to these requests? How do we work together to ensure we are not acting without strategy or thought? We are bound by collective agreements and the regulations of the School Act. Are there compromises that can be made?
- Want to continue the dialogue and remain open to discussion. Need to move forward in a timely fashion.
- Recognition of the dynamic, innovative and creative programs and teachers in the district already. Lots of wonderful things are happening at our schools and in our classrooms. It is important to get information about these programs out to parents.
- There is a concern that the basic/regular classroom will become fractured. Many parents are happy with the educational programming in the district as it is.
- Recognizing and embracing these opportunities while supporting learning for <u>all</u> students.

(f) New Teacher Mentoring

The steering committee's first meeting with facilitator Nancy Hinds took place on February 3. The meeting was very positive and the committee's goals were met. Application forms have been developed. There will be a meeting with new teachers on February 16.

(g) District Pro D Day, February 27 – Gordon Neufeld

February 27 is a district Pro D day and the GITA Pro D Committee has invited keynote speaker Dr. Gordon Neufeld, "child developmental psychologist and author of the international bestseller with Gabor Mate *Hold on to Your Kids*". He will speak on two topics: Relationship Matters: Harnessing the Power of Attachment and How to Keep Children Safe in a Wounding World. There is a request for the Board, CUPE and DPAC to contribute \$2,000 each to cover the attendance of district stakeholders who wish to attend.

It was moved and seconded that the Board of Education approves the expenditure of \$2,000 towards the cost of hosting Dr. Gordon Neufeld at ArtSpring on Friday, February 27 to support the attendance of exempt staff, trustees and community members.

9. <u>CORPORATE FINANCIAL OFFICER'S REPORT</u>

(a) Monthly Expenditure Report

The monthly expenditure report, as at January 31, 2015 indicates that with 0.5833 of the year completed, 0.5171 of the budget has been expended. We are 6.6 % below budget at this time.

(b) Amended Annual Budget 2014/2015

Manager of Finance Cindy Rodgers presented and spoke in detail to the Amended Annual Budget for 2014/2015. Ms. Rodgers indicated the document shows a balanced budget and stated the district likely won't end the year in a deficit.

This Amended Annual Budget of \$22,819,914 is compilation of the Operating, Capital and Special Purpose Funds. It is to be submitted to the Ministry by the end of this month. Ms. Rodgers invites anyone to contact her if they have any questions or would like clarification on any points.
